We at CC-33 have been working hard to bring you one of the best Costume-Cons ever. We are currently working to obtain a hotel contract with a Charleston, SC hotel for our event and hope to have it signed and settled by the end of May 2013. Our con com is planning several fun events over the course of our four day convention with lots of great programming, workshops and we are negotiating to see if we can provide a special tour of the Charleston Museum textile collection. We plan to host a special competition division of our "Quilt Show" for kids' quilts after which we will ask that these special quilts be donated to young cancer patients at MUSC (Medical University of South Carolina) Children's Hospital, Our Sunday cotillion and brunch where you will be entertained by Co-Con Chair Rob Himmelsbach's special competition "Miss Ellen's Portieres", and last but not least a different and very special Monday night "Dead Dog party" at one of Charleston's hottest

We are also pleased to announce that this coming November of 2013 we will be working in conjunction with the Charleston fan community to help launch their first "Atomacon". (The Atomacon folks have been instrumental in helping us so far with the details for Costume-Con 33 and we look forward to their help in expanding our programming, in the areas of Anime, Cosplay, Steampunk, and Rococopunk costuming. Both Rob and I will be there to help run the first Atomacon masguerade competition and assist with their costume programming, and we ask that you take a moment to look at the Atomacon web site at http://atomacon.org. If you are available to lend a hand or your experience, or just attend a brand new convention, please get in touch with their con com. We are looking at the opportunity to offer a few extra days stay at the con hotel as well, so our members can also experience the many wonders that historic Charleston, SC has to offer. Charleston was picked by the CC#33 site selection committee because it is a destination city, with a little something to pique everyone's interest, from historic sites to breathe taking sunrises and sunsets. A food lover's dream with restaurants galore from gourmet to the neighborhood luncheonette, Charleston has something to suit everyone's taste. We will be soon polling the convention membership about interest in a Gray Line city tour. If we get enough interest we plan to schedule a city tour to give our members an idea of what is around the city so that they may return for a visit on their own time. Programming:

Masquerades:

I'm Byron Connell, director of the Science Fiction and Fantasy masquerade. CC 3 was my first Costume-Con, followed by CC 5. Since then, I've been to every Costume-Con since CC 7, except CC 20. Usually, I'm the guy running the green room. However, I've directed masquerades at regional science fiction conventions as well as two world science fiction conventions (Anticipation and Chicon 7). While I directed the Historical masquerades at CC 24, 25, and 29, this will be only the second time I've directed a Costume-Con Science Fiction masquerade. My first was at CC 10, where I was the codirector. I intend to bring my experience in directing CC historical masquerades as well as worldcon masquerades to the CC 33 Science Fiction and Fantasy masquerade.

I am Dana MacDermott, and I have taken on the responsibility of running the Costume-Con 33 Historical Masquerade. This will be my first time in this role, although I have run the Future Fashion Show, and participated in other positions of responsibility on a Costume-Con staff. Beyond the nuts and bolts of running the Masquerade, my primary concern will be to find ways to expand participation in our Historical costuming show/competition. I am particularly interested in encouraging first time entrants, the idea being, get them onto stage, make it an enjoyable experience, and they will do it again. To this end, I will be trying some new approaches. Stay tuned, and you will see how this develops.

Miss Ellen's Portieres

As any obsessive reader of Gone with the Wind (such as my co-chair) knows, like the notorious Rhett Butler, Scarlet's mother, the eponymous Miss Ellen, comes from an old Charleston Family. In her honor, we are including a small side competition at CC33, entitled Miss Ellen's Portieres. The rules are pretty simple - buy, find or even make a set of curtains; then make clothing or a full costume out of them. As

simple as a pinafore from a set of kitchen cafe curtains. As elaborate as a Klingon wedding suit from an old set of theater curtains. Turkish harem outfit from something garish you found at the dollar store. Or maybe even Victorian Dalek (velvet, fringe and trim for days). Please see our website for complete rules.



Other Bits of Information

For a lot of you, the emphasis we've made on Charleston's Historical connections and CC33's theme may leave you wondering where is the Science Fiction and Fantasy? Never fear, there is a connection there as well.

The late Robert Jordan, author of the monumental fantasy series The Wheel of Time, was a Charleston native and graduate of the Citadel. The final volume of the series, now co-authored by Brandon Sanderson, should be out in hardcover early in 2013. In Jordan's world, created for this series, peoples and nations and orders are easily identified by characteristic clothes and styles - lovingly described by Jordan in some detail as characters in the novels travel across these lands and interact with the people. Some of the principal characters have also adopted unique clothing or accessories (q.v. Mat's flat-brimmed black hat) that make them instantly identifiable. Many of the styles of clothing described in the novels are easily reproducible by using historical garment patterns - not always from the same culture and/or time in any one costume!

On the Science Fiction front, I have to say that not as much has taken place locally - unless you watch Falling Skies, the post-apocalyptic/alien invasion series on TNT, where by the end of the second season, the intepid band of survivors (the 2nd Massachusetts Militia) has made their way to the seat of the newly reformed American Government - in Charleston SC!

Anyone else out there better read or more into media that can add some Charleston SF&F connections to mine?

Why Charleston?


